## FHJ Submission Guidelines 2023



The Folk Harp Journal relies on the excellent content and submissions that we receive from our members. We appreciate and are excited to read about any harp adventures, stories, music, or ideas that you would like to share with our readers. The following are some guidelines to help with your submission. If you have questions after reviewing the guidelines, please reach out to me for assistance.

The *FHJ* is PLANNED! As one issue is going to press, I have usually already chosen the articles for the next issue and will quickly determine the articles for the following issue. Article deadlines assume we have discussed your idea, and it is a planned part of an issue. If you submit something unsolicited, your story will be used when appropriate as space allows. As you can see, my lead time is long in deciding what will run—so do not expect to see a submission printed immediately. I am always looking for interesting adventure stories that are told in the first person and describe an individual journey—perhaps 1,500-2,000 words. We do not run Q&A's, so you must submit in a story format. We also need pictures to be an important part of the story. If you are interested in sending me something, I will be happy to review the submission. However, I do not guarantee when or if the story or music will run. We search for balance in content and views and not all things are appropriate, or timely, for our audience.

Please send articles in a Word document and limit formatting—such as fonts, tabs, indents, and returns. **Remove all hyperlinks.** Do not include pictures in the file. Pictures should be sent as separate attachments. Pictures should be submitted as jpeg files at 300dpi at actual size, if possible. If you have more than one or two photos, **do not email them**. Please put them in Dropbox, Google Drive, etc., and send me the link.

This is the "FHI Stylebook." Many of these may seem weird but these items are adjusted when I do the layout in InDesign.

- •There is ONE space after a period, exclamation mark, etc.
- The basic body font and size for the *Journal* is Adobe Garamond Pro 12pt.
- •Don't put indents in the first line of a paragraph.
- •Don't put spaces after bullet points before text.
- Don't put in extra paragraph returns. This might look weird on your screen, but this is corrected in my style setup.
- Song titles are in "quotes" and collections and book titles are in *italic*.
- Capitalize most chronological periods of music history (the Renaissance, the Baroque, the Classical era, the Romantic piano) but not "medieval." However, don't capitalize genres (use folk, traditional, opera, symphony, jazz) except for Celtic, Welsh, etc.
- Major and minor are not capitalized (as in... This work is in C major) unless, obviously, it is part of a title. The names of the modes are capitalized.
- •Periods/commas/etc. go inside quote marks.
- Website references no longer need to include the http or www. Websites are not case-sensitive, so I use uppercase letters on keywords such as FolkHarpSociety.org.
- Quotes of more than four lines are indented in a standalone paragraph.
- Don't link footnotes or included them mid-text/or bottom of page. A separate document is best for layout.
- •I'm married to a journalist. So, when I have usage/text questions I start with the AP Stylebook. In case you are wondering.

**Music** must be submitted as a PDF with fonts embedded. Please add the title of the piece to each page but not page numbers. Be sure to have a harp friend proof your arrangement. Double check the grand staff format, pick-up note balance, and note values in each measure. The *FHJ* does not formally analyze the technical qualities of each arrangement. Please include a SHORT bio of yourself (in Word or email) that will run along with your arrangement.

**Classified ads** are free to members of the ISFHC and must be 50 words or less. We **do not** publish events in the Classified area, only the **Calendar** section. For questions or to submit a classified ad, email Beth A. Stockdell at fhj@stockdell.com.
